Impact Report 2012-2013 Oasis domestic abuse service



Dear friends

I would like to thank all of our supporters; the ways that you help this cause with your kindness is heart-warming and humbling. We have begun delivery of our mentoring work that aims to prevent young people falling into problematic relationships. These young people are going through a difficult transition from childhood to adulthood and are often carrying life experiences with them that we would not wish on our own. It is a time when a mentor can be a much needed source of support and a valuable role model. It is Oasis aim to provide much more of this valuable support in its ambition to undermine both the causes and consequences of domestic abuse, and subsequently the horrific impact it has on families. Many of the children we work with see and hear and experience things that as a society we should commit ourselves to ending.

The ambition for this work has grown out of our learning over the past three years about the experiences the children who come into our refuge are having at home. It also comes from our understanding that many, but not all, of the adults we work with will have had difficulties in childhood. For this reason we began the campaign 'Love Shouldn't Hurt' a tagline kindly gifted by our partners Rising Sun Domestic Violence and Abuse Service in Canterbury. The campaign began with a wonderful art competition through schools in Thanet including; Cliftonville Primary, Palm Bay Primary, Chartfield Primary and St Joseph's Catholic Primary School. The children drew their representation of the theme and some kind supporters of the charity presented a prize giving at the Turner Contemporary. The aim of the campaign is to embed the concept in the minds of all of the children and young people in Kent as they grow into adulthood. It has been underpinned by two wonderful events gifted to us – The Postcard Auction on from our kind supporter Fiona Sherriff of the Harbour Arm and The Vagina Monologues produced by the Tom Thumb Theatre and the marvellous Jan Dunn.

Our adult work is so crucial in keeping families safe and we continue to devote energy to ensuring these are as effective as possible, but in the year ahead we turn and face head on the need to enable children to have the resilience to move safely into adult life. The kind support of all of you who receive this newsletter enables us to do that, and we remain indebted to you for this kindness.

This fantastic event raised £5000 for Oasis to bring the love love shouldn't hurt message to children and young people.





Postcard Auction

Oasis and Pilgrim's Hospice joined together for a postcard auction at the Margate Harbour Arm Gallery early in September 2012. There were 100 pieces of artwork anonymously auctioned off to the public. There was a mixture of contributions from local artists, Oasis clients, hospice patients and well-known names such as Tracey Emin and Prime Minister David Cameron. The event raised nearly £8000 for Oasis and Pilgrim's.

Loukia Michael, Community Fundraiser at Oasis said: "the atmosphere at the auction was fantastic and the bidding for the Tracey Emin Pieces was particularly exciting. There are so many people to thank – bidders, artists, guests, sponsors and the auctions – but I would like to say a special thank you to Fiona Sheriff of the Margate Harbour Arm for giving Oasis the opportunity to get involved with such a popular community event."

Inside Oasis Women's Refuge

The Oasis Refuge accommodation is available 100% of the year. From January 2012- March 2013 the refuge housed 51 families/single women, with 35 children in these families. This averages at 40 families in a 12 month period with 28 children. The average length of stay is 3.6 months in a 12 month period.

The refuge team provide support, empowerment, involvement, safety and security in line with the Kent County Council commissioned services requirements, and the refuge operated at Level A of their quality standard. There were no complaints from residents, and the organisation sought feedback regularly to inform good practice.

"When I arrived the room was comfortable, it felt safe and snug. I had no fear of my perpetrator turning up."

"I feel 110% helped –especially in terms of self-esteem and confidence. I am getting back to my real self and taking it day by day. I now feel able to do normal household tasks without having to ask permission. Also being allowed to cook."

"Our sense of community isn't limited to just the children and women during their stay with Oasis; they can access our continued support after they leave, just like someone would with their family. We offer a support group for current and ex residents. People who lived here 10 years ago still visit us regularly. It is good when current residents meet ex residents because they can see the light at the end of tunnel and see that they can move on with their lives. Women and children need to feel safe and comfortable; because that helps them want to stay."

"They come in with nothing, completely demoralised and you watch them grow, you see the change quite quickly. It gives you an inner glow when you see the transformation."

Supporting the Children in Oasis' Refuge

Identifying and meeting the needs of children is another important aspect of the work of the refuge, as the impact of domestic abuse on children can often be overlooked. All children at the refuge have been adversely affected in some way by living in and atmosphere of abuse and some have also been directly physically and sometimes sexually abused.

Our specialist play –worker at the refuge provides a range of activities both in the play room and outside the refuge to encourage children to play and express themselves, to share and socialise and interact with each other in a positive manner. The play worker with the refuge support team enable the family to grow and repair bonds. Oasis fundraises for this post and is grateful to the Lloyds TSB Foundation for this grant for two years.

Where do our clients go?

89% of our resettled clients were as part of a planned move. We support clients as much as possible to make the choices that are right for them and that they are happy with. Oasis does a great deal of safety planning and other work with our clients to improve their chances of success.

What improvements did Oasis make?

During 2012 clients requested more support with healthy lifestyle choices and more activities within the refuge. This led to a staff member attending training on supporting clients to adopt healthier lifestyles' which has influenced the one-to-one support. Sarah said "I really appreciate all the hard work the staff have put in to help me. I have learnt to cook some really interesting dishes – I now know how to make a quiche!" The Oasis refuge team have also been trialling new group activities such as Dance and Drama and Keep Fit.


The couple had a skinful, angued and had a fight. Thats what I thought would happen, even though its still not right.

When it happened to my loved one within my family. I realised just how ignorant and naive I had been. OASIS was a godsend they helped to ease her pain.



Oasis in the Community

Independent Domestic Violence Advocates (IDVA) Leading Lights

Oasis Independent Domestic Violence Advisors (IDVAs) work was awarded Leading Lights accreditation. Highlighting the excellent work we have been providing for Thanet. This award means that Oasis now helps deliver the IDVA service across Kent as part of the Kent Domestic Abuse Consortium so that everyone in Kent gets the high quality service we provide.

IDVAs work with those in the community who are dealing with domestic abuse, they provide safety plans, impartial advice, legal support, communicate with multiple agencies and provide a listening ear to all those that call them.

Sue* said the following when asked about her IDVA "She has been brilliant, really supportive. Just knowing she was there for a good old chat and that she would make time to listen. My family were always there for me but having someone from outside that really understood made a big difference

The Life of a Court IDVA

We support a wide variety of people through the courts. The role of the Court IDVA often extends beyond offering support purely for the purposes of the Criminal Justice System (CJS), and therefore many positive impacts that the client experiences may not necessarily relate to the experience of the CJS directly, however, the CJS has an essential role to play in the client's overall wellbeing.

I am currently supporting a number of clients who have mental health issues, which appear to have been exacerbated by the domestic abuse that they are experiencing. In all cases, having the support from the IDVA, both when going through the court process and identifying their additional needs to then refer onto appropriate agencies has increased their wellbeing. One client has been coping with the abuse she is subjected to by serious self-harming, another approached our service due to an impending court case, and has now been able to disclose issues around her pregnancy and outline the extent of a serious assault when making a report to the police. Both clients are now engaged with other agencies who can offer them additional mental health support, which I feel may not have taken place without the IDVA input.

In effect, the relationship that the IDVA can develop with the client requires an approach which embraces all components of the client's experience, ensuring that as many of their needs are met through signposting and support. This is a wonderful opportunity to develop trust with the client and ensure that they are fully informed and therefore empowered to take the journey through the court system, having a strong voice during this process and increasing the likelihood of successful prosecutions and outcomes within the system, as well as making effective and longer term positive changes within their own lives.

As the Thanet KM charity of the year Oasis has been very lucky, and has taken part in the sponsored events the KM offers local charities. In particular an Oasis client took part in the Abseil with her family to fundraise for our work to continue in the community.






Recovery and Prevention

Oasis Therapeutic Support

Domestic abuse is not just physical, it can leave scars that cannot be seen that leave impressions for life. These invisible scars can really alter a woman or child's life, their confidence and trust are worn down. That is why Oasis offer a counselling service to residents and community clients, which allows them to explore their feeling and helps them grow back the trust and confidence that gives them the ability to go out into society and make a positive difference once again. We help to restore those feelings of self-worth, self-respect and self-esteem that have been worn down by the power and control of a perpetrator of domestic abuse.

Our women and children are the ones that lead themselves to independence. Oasis refuge offers a safe place to explore all of the damage they have suffered in a protected place that ultimately gives them the space to grow into independent confident individuals. These survivors often have issues developing new relationships, Oasis gives them ways to cope with these problems and to have the trust and ability to have a good positive relationship.

New Projects – Oasis' Children and Young People's Mentoring

We are constantly learning and improving at Oasis. We have noticed a need to direct resources to working with children and young people at risk and who have been affected by domestic abuse. We also need to support those experiencing intimate abuse at a young age and those with complex needs due to life-long trauma. That is why Oasis are starting children, young person's and young adult's mentoring schemes that will go into the community to support young people who are at risk of becoming instigating abuse or being victimised. In this way we will test this scheme for enabling young people to develop resilience and avoid difficult relationships in later life. We are also delivering a specialist mentor funded by KCC. Our 'Positive Relationships' worker focusses specifically on girls who are at risk of early pregnancy, sexualisation and/<u>or domestic abuse</u>.

Positive Relationships Case study *

Helen is a 15 year old girl who has been through our mentoring scheme. Helen was referred to our mentor Alex by her school after they noticed she was starting to miss school, often coming in increasingly late in the mornings.

Mentor Alex said the following;

"Our meetings were very relaxed. My role is ultimately to give girls like Helen someone to talk to on their level. We play pool or go for a cup of hot chocolate if it's raining and we just talk about what Helen wants to talk about. Talking to someone you don't know about your private life can be very difficult especially if you're a young person, so to building trust is important. Helen had very low self-esteem. Running late for school because she felt she had to do her make-up to be accepted. We would talk about peer pressure and relationships. During these conversations Helen would discuss her new boyfriend who had started preventing her from talking to her friends. We talked a lot about what a healthy relationship should be like. We would talk about theoretical situations a lot, for instance is it ok for a boy to hit a girl if she has done something he doesn't like. She would give her view and I would give mine. We would meet when Helen wanted to, typically it would be every two weeks but if she had more issues going on it would be more often because I was impartial. I don't tell the young people I work with what to do, and I don't judge. I listen and we chat. After 6 months I stopped seeing Helen, because she was attending school a lot more, and arriving on time. Helen told me she felt more confident and hoping to get into college after she finished her GCSE's."

What has been your best moment?


The best moment so far was the Ambassadors morning. Having so many interested, influential and committed people in one room and hearing Tina speak about the Oasis work was inspiring for everyone.
